No-Cost, Hands-On Assistance to Apply for the WaterSMART Cooperative Watershed Management Program

The Cooperative Watershed Management Program (CWMP) Phase 1 (Watershed Group Development and Watershed Restoration Planning) provides funding to grassroots, local watershed groups to encourage diverse stakeholders to form local solutions to address their water management needs. USBR defines a watershed groups as a "self sustaining, non-regulatory group that is composed of a diverse array of stakeholders, which may include, but is not limited to, private property owners, non-profit organizations, Federal, state, or local agencies, and tribes."

Eligible Projects Include:

- Watershed group development
- Watershed restoration planning
- Watershed management project design

Who's Eligible to Apply?

New and existing Watershed Groups are eligible, and must be located in the Western US and includes states, Indian Tribes, local and special districts (e.g., irrigation water districts, water conservation districts), local government entities, interstate organizations, and non-profit organizations.

Federal Funding Amount:

• Up to \$300,000 per applicant (\$100,000 per year up to three years); a non-Federal cost share contribution is not required.
